• The WITH Foundation, in partnership with the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, has issued an RFP for efforts to support healthcare equity in communities of color for older adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Through the RFP, grants ranging from \$50,000 to \$100,000 will be awarded for collaborative proposals that support projects fostering health and healthcare systems transformation for older adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities of color, centering this population's goals, perspectives, and needs. Proposals should prioritize implementation, educational resources, advocacy, or research. Proposals are due by August 15, 2023.

• <u>CALL FOR PAPERS:</u> Drs. Lesley Tarasoff and Hilary Brown are Co-Guest Editors for a special collection for <u>Archives of Women's Mental Health</u> on Disability and Mental Health Across the Reproductive Life Course. <u>The call for papers can be found here</u>.

We are looking for original research, systematic reviews, and short communications investigating mental health outcomes and mental health care experiences among women with disabilities related to the menstrual cycle, fertility/conception and pregnancy, postpartum and parenting, and the menopausal transition. We will consider quantitative study designs on populations with physical, vision, hearing, and intellectual or developmental disabilities. We encourage the submission of interdisciplinary studies, studies that examine the intersections of ableism and other forms of oppression such as racism, and studies from all global contexts.

b. The submission deadline is November 30, 2023.

• <u>CALL FOR PAPERS: Special Issue on Autism and Aging: A Lifespan Approach in Autism in</u> <u>Adulthood</u>. This special issue will address the dearth of published research on older Autistic adults by focusing on autism and aging. Authors are encouraged to explore Autistic experience in adulthood and later life from a variety of frameworks and approaches, including those that use a biopsychosocial perspective or build upon social or social relational models of disability, rights-based models, the neurodiversity paradigm, or models of social inclusion.

(2023). <u>"They had the lunch lady coming up to assist": The experiences of</u> <u>menarche and menstrual management for adolescents with physical disabilities.</u> Disability and Health Journal, 101510.

• We sought to understand the parent's perspective of the experience of their daughter with a physical disability around menarche and their preferences for health care provider support through 21 semi-structured interviews of parents. All parents reported that their daughters faced challenges during menarche, ranging from emotional distress to dealing with the inaccessibility of hygiene products. Parents who were better educated about what to expect were better able to prepare their daughters, but had difficulties finding informed, supportive providers. Health care providers should provide both anticipatory guidance and holistic, respectful, and equitable options for the management of menstrual symptoms.
