• Micheal Pham, a doctoral candidate at the University of Southern California, is conducting an IRB-approved research study on access to Activity-Based Therapy (ABT) for individuals with neurological conditions. The study aims to better understand barriers to accessing ABT and amplify the voices of individuals living with neurological conditions to inform more equitable rehabilitation services in the future. Participation involves completing a brief 10-minute anonymous online survey, with the option to take part in a compensated follow-up interview. a. Northwestern University is accepting applications for a one- or two- year Post-Doctoral Fellowship on Disability Policy Research (DPR). The fellowship provides experiential training, knowledge, and skills in disability policy research with the goal of developing a cohort of experts capable of advancing policies that improve the lives of people with disabilities. - Amilon, A., & Christensen, M.L. (2025). <u>Changing Disability Status and Changes in Health,</u>
 <u>Participation Restrictions and Activity Limitations in Denmark: Does the Choice of Measure</u>
 <u>Matter? Scandinavian Journal of Disability Research</u>, 27(1), 15-29
 - a. Using nationally representative longitudinal survey data from Denmark, this study compared two widely used disability measures—the Washington Group Short Set on Functioning (WG-SS) and the Global Activity Limitation Indicator (GALI). The authors found that disability status is highly dynamic, with many individuals transitioning in and out of disability over time. WG-SS identified a higher prevalence of changing disability status than GALI, reflecting differences in how each measure defines disability. Transitions in disability status were strongly associated with changes in health, participation restrictions, and activity limitations, underscoring that disability is not a fixed state and that the choice of measurement tool substantially influences who is identified as disabled in surveys.

- Khaikin, L. (2025). When Aid Fails in Uganda. Fair Planet
 - a. As conflict in eastern DRC drives thousands into Uganda's Kyangwali settlement, major funding cuts and World Food Programme ration reductions have left over half the settlement's residents without assistance. Refugees with disabilities are among those excluded, with aid categorization systems and registration data gaps often failing to capture their needs. The article details the human toll of these cuts, including hunger, school dropouts, social isolation, and rising despair among long-term residents.

DHERN Member Submissions

- Rfat, M (2025.) <u>Coordinated action needed amid mass deportations of Afghans</u>. *The Lancet Global Health*, 13(9), e1515.
 - a. The forced deportation of nearly 2 million Afghans from Iran, Pakistan, and Tajikistan is fueling a severe humanitarian crisis, violating international protections against *non-refoulement*. Afghanistan, already facing food insecurity and a collapsing health system, lacks the capacity to absorb large-scale returns, leaving vulnerable groups—such as people with disabilities—at heightened risk. The article calls for

urgent regional and global action to suspend forced returns, provide immediate aid, and establish safe, durable reintegration strategies.
