Database Management and Creation – I have worked with large administrative databases, criminal history databases, and social science databases. I created a comprehensive criminal history database that tracks the criminal case processing for all arrests in the state of Texas across a 13-year period. I also helped create and manage a national survey database, qualitative coding databases, and a sports statistics database.

Surveys – I have designed, conducted, and analyzed multiple surveys, both independently and in collaboration with a team of researchers.
